Dear Ones,

Sometimes I wonder, when I look out on a Sunday morning, how many of us are thinking, "No one understands how hard my life is right now." I wonder.

Soulful music arises out of deep troubles. Here's one composed in the pain of slavery: (I hear Paul Robeson's stirring voice)

Nobody knows the trouble I've seen Nobody knows my sorrow Nobody knows the trouble I've seen Glory hallelujah! Sometimes I'm up, sometimes I'm down Oh, yes, Lord Sometimes I'm almost to the ground Oh, yes, Lord Although you see me going 'long so Oh, yes, Lord I have my trials here below Oh, yes, Lord

Oh yes, Lord. There's always been trouble. On an autumn day 380 years ago, Michael Neumark, a tailor, sent his son Georg off to college from their little German village. He sewed the money they had scrimped to save into his son's coat. It was dangerous to travel. On the way, Georg was attacked and robbed. College was no longer an option. Bereft, he wandered from town to town, living hand to mouth, desperately searching for work. He was near the end of his rope when, out of nowhere, a job dropped into his lap. He found work as a tutor for the children of a wealthy family. In two years, he saved enough money to begin his law studies.

Years later, George Neumark was reading Psalm 55. One of its verses caught his heart: "Cast your cares upon the Lord, and he will sustain you." Moved by his own struggle with trouble, he sat down and composed a poem. It has comforted untold thousands in the years since. Even though its language is archaic, to the patient, careful reader, its words ring with truth. I share them here for those wrestling with trouble, known or unknown.

"If Thou But Suffer God to Guide Thee" by Georg Neumark, 1621-1681 Translated by Catherine Winkworth, 1829-1878

 If thou but suffer God to guide thee And hope in Him through all thy ways, He'll give thee strength, whate'er betide thee, And bear thee through the evil days. Who trusts in God's unchanging love Builds on the Rock that naught can move.

2. What can these anxious cares avail thee, These never-ceasing moans and sighs? What can it help if thou bewail thee O'er each dark moment as it flies? Our cross and trials do but press The heavier for our bitterness.

3. Be patient and await His leisure In cheerful hope, with heart content To take whate'er thy Father's pleasure And His discerning love hath sent, Nor doubt our inmost wants are known To Him who chose us for His own. 4. God knows full well when times of gladness
Shall be the needful thing for thee.
When He has tried thy soul with sadness
And from all guile has found thee free,
He comes to thee all unaware
And makes thee own His loving care.

5. Nor think amid the fiery trial That God hath cast thee off unheard, That he whose hopes meet no denial Must surely be of God preferred. Time passes and much change doth bring And sets a bound to everything.

6. All are alike before the Highest;
'Tis easy to our God, we know,
To raise thee up, though low thou liest,
To make the rich man poor and low.
True wonders still by Him are wrought
Who setteth up and brings to naught.

7. Sing, pray, and keep His ways unswerving, Perform thy duties faithfully, And trust His Word, though undeserving, Thou yet shalt find it true for thee. God never yet forsook in need The soul that trusted Him indeed.

It's in our hymnal now, or, at least a portion of it is, making cut after cut of new hymnals, green, blue, red, burgundy, and purple and the passing of time. The reason for that is that it speaks to the suffering soul. I pray it might speak to yours.
